CHILD PROTECTION POLICY REVIEW

Hope for Cambodian Children Foundation is a community-based care Organization. Child Safety is our priority. HOPE has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Social Affairs Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation (MoSVY) to support vulnerable children and poor families who are under the care of the HOPE Community Centre.

According to the procedure of MoSVY, the HOPE Community Centre needs to review about Child Protection Policy with staff at least two times per year to ensure that staff has read understood, and obeyed the policy while they work with the children even in the HOPE Community Centre and the Community.

Miss Sokhoum, the Social Welfare Manager reviewed the Child Protection Policy in each department with a different schedule. Most of the HOPE staff understood and they obeyed the policy every time they went for a home visit or even to the HOPE Community Centre.

The riders enjoyed themselves and were proud of the unexpected beautiful welcome. HOPE received 2628 USD from the CCF event and 100 USD for the student's performance from the generous riders Mr. Puth Try presented the Certificate of Appreciation to CCF.

Pisey VI

Prevention Mother to Child Transmission Program

Each month, HOPE staff usually make home visits to follow up with beneficiaries and maintain close relationships with the family and local authorities.

In February, the social workers made a home visit with the director to a 17-month-old girl, Vi Pisey, and her family at Bour Village, Bour Commune, Phnom Preuk District, Battambang Province. Pisey has one 12-year-old brother studying grade 2 in the primary school. Her family is very poor. They live on the property of Pisey's grandmother because their house was destroyed by the storm. Her mother works as a laundry laborer. This job is not stable because this job will according to the neighbor ask her to do the laundry, and each time she will get 2.5 USD to 7.5 USD per day.

During the visit, the social workers monitored that Pisey was very healthy and doing very well. The mom followed the hygiene guidelines and went to the local Health Post Centre regularly to get her medication. Last August HOPE hosted a nutrition food training to the moms by the Senior Nurse from the Battambang Department of Health and Pisey's mom joined the training. She made the nutrition food for Pisey at home regularly and now Pisey can have regular meals with her family. She fully understands and obeys the hygiene guidelines and follows the steps.

According to the regulation of support of Hope for Cambodian Children Foundation's Prevention Mother to Child Transmission Program, HOPE will support Pisey for 18 months of milk formula. The time is up next month. According to the family condition, HOPE decided to support nutrition food; rice, fruits, eggs, vegetables, and some money to Pisey for another six months under the Prevention Mother to Child Transmission Program. The new contract will be made next month.







Mrs. Sophat POL, 40 years old lady has 3 daughters. Her husband is Thea NHEK, 41 years old, and unemployed. Currently, they live in Takok Village, Nora Commune, Sangke District, Battambang Province.

Sophat is a housewife who takes care of her children, cooks, wash clothes, and sends her children to school in the morning. In the afternoon, she takes time to go to the rice fields to pick water morning glory, pick tamarin leaves, and catch crabs, and snails to sell. Sometimes she earns 3,000 to 5,000 riels to buy rice to support her family. Sometimes, she only buys rice, no fish, only one duck egg with fish sauce for 5 people (mother and children). Her husband did not help his wife, only thinking about drinking, drugs, and violence against his wife and children almost every day, causing the children to miss school because of fear of their father beating them. The mother did not dare to leave her children at home with her father. When she went to pick vegetables in the fields, she always took her children with her, causing the children to not go to school regularly.

In July 2023, the Hope for Cambodian Children Foundation held a basic sewing training course. The Social workers collaborated with local authorities, especially the Commune Committee of Women and Children (CCWC) to select poor families a women in the community to receive the sewing training course. The CCWC went to find poor families, including Sophat, who came to learn sewing and received knowledge of life skills. Sophat received financial support for daily food while she came to learn sewing skills with the Hope for Cambodian Children Foundation. Sophat persevered and overcame all problems. Even though she faced difficulties in her family and was often beaten by her husband, she refused to give up on this training.

She persevered until she completed the 8-month course with good grades. She received a sewing machine from the Hope for Cambodian Children Foundation.

After completing the course, the social worker contacted a private shop in Samrong commune, Battambang province, so that Sophat could continue her training in sewing the trousers for another 15 days. Since Sophat received the training, she was able to sew the trousers and started sewing. She earned 50,000 riels (12.5 USD) to 100,000 riels (25 USD) in the first month. In addition to sewing trousers, she took up other jobs, such as helping to clean the health centre for 2 hours a day and washing dishes at a noodle restaurant for one hour a day, earning 600,000 riels (150 USD) a month. This made Sophat's family have a better life. The children went to school regularly. Sophat's husband also reduced domestic violence and helped her find a job as a security guard, earning 400,000 riels (100 USD) a month to help support the family. Sophat was very happy because she was proud of herself, able to improve her family's life, the children went to school regularly, and her husband's personality changed significantly.
